

ICYMI: CNN Poll: Women reject Kavanaugh -- the Senate must follow

Yet another poll shows Brett Kavanaugh has the lowest support of any Supreme Court nominee in 30 years, with women driving opposition to Trump's anti-abortion nominee. [According to CNN](#), **a low 28% of women want Kavanaugh to be confirmed**. That isn't surprising given Kavanaugh's record on women's reproductive rights and *Roe v. Wade* at stake.

This is just the latest poll showing record-breaking low support for Kavanaugh: For as long as [Gallup](#) has been tracking (the last 30 years), there has **NEVER** been a Supreme Court nominee who more Americans opposed than supported.

"Kavanaugh's low level of support is thanks to women. Only 28% of women say President Donald Trump's Supreme Court nominee should be confirmed.

"The poll doesn't ask why women don't support Kavanaugh, but Democrats opposed to his nomination have raised the possibility that he would be the deciding vote to repeal *Roe v. Wade*, the landmark Supreme Court case that protected the right to an abortion."

"That said, all of the recent polling – CNN, Quinnipiac, Marist, Pew Research Center, and Gallup – points to unusually and unexpectedly weak support for the current high-court nominee.

"...But my best guess is that much of the recent coverage has focused on the likely consequences of Kavanaugh's confirmation – including, among other things, the expected demise of the **Roe v. Wade precedent – and much of the public is understandably concerned about the dramatic changes a newly emboldened, far-right Supreme Court might impose.**"

"Disapproval of Kavanaugh in the CNN poll was largely driven by women, with 46 percent saying the Senate should reject him and only 28 saying he should be confirmed.

"...Abortion rights advocates have said they are worried that Kavanaugh's confirmation could lead to the nation's highest court moving to reverse *Roe v. Wade*, the landmark Supreme Court decision that legalized abortion."

Statement from Dawn Laguens, Executive Vice President of Planned Parenthood Action Fund:

"Women reject Kavanaugh -- the Senate must listen and do the same. People know their constitutional right to abortion is on the line, and they're taking action. Last week alone, our supporters hosted over 300 actions across the country calling on the Senate to reject Kavanaugh. This is a fight we can and must win, for all of our rights and freedoms."
