<a href="#">HB 625</a>	Bans abortion at 24 weeks gestation with almost no exceptions. Requires mandatory ultrasounds prior to all abortion care, regardless of stage of pregnancy. This bill passed the full House. The Senate tabled the bill and added the language to the state budget, which was then signed by the governor and took effect January 1, 2022.
<a href="#">HB 233</a>	Denies families who are grieving the loss of their child the ability to choose the compassionate care that's best for them, such as religious rites and sacraments. House majority leadership changed the order of this bill to vote a day earlier than previously scheduled – and late in the day, after some representatives left for the day. This bill passed the full House. The Senate amended the bill and the House later voted to not accept the changes by the Senate.
<a href="#">HB 1609</a>	Adds three exceptions (fatal fetal diagnoses, rape, incest) to the newly-enacted abortion ban; removes the mandatory ultrasound requirement, includes collecting abortion data after 24 weeks. This bill passed the full House and was referred to another House committee, which amended the bill to include one exception (fatal fetal diagnoses) and removing the mandatory ultrasound requirement. This amended bill passed the full House and full Senate and was signed into law by the governor.
<a href="#">HB 1673 amendment</a>	Adds fatal fetal diagnosis to the newly-enacted abortion ban; removes criminal penalties for health care providers. This amendment failed in the House by 2 votes.
<a href="#">HB 1080</a>	Allows employees at a pharmacy to deny contraception, including condoms, to individuals based on personal beliefs. This bill passed the full House and was referred to Interim Study by the Senate.
<a href="#">HB 1625</a>	Removes New Hampshire's patient safety zone law, which allows, but does not require, reproductive health centers to enact a zone up to 25 feet for patients and providers to safely enter and exit the center. This bill passed the full House and full Senate and was vetoed by the governor.
