Overview

The Florida Alliance of Planned Parenthood Affiliates is the nonpartisan advocacy and political arm of Planned Parenthood health centers in Florida. In partnership with more than 820,000 activists, supporters and donors in the state, the Florida Alliance of Planned Parenthood Affiliates advocates for access to our 22 health centers where patients receive nonjudgmental, compassionate, affordable and quality care. With nearly 78% of Planned Parenthood health centers in medically underserved areas, Planned Parenthood continues to be a trusted provider for communities in need.

It's been 47 years since the landmark decision in *Roe v. Wade*, which made clear that the United States Constitution protects every woman's right to make her own personal medical decisions, including abortion. Yet politicians in Florida have shown that they will stop at nothing to end access not only to abortion but to the full spectrum of reproductive health care.

In 2019, we saw renewed attacks on reproductive healthcare in the legislature as well as the appointment of three new state Supreme Court justices by Governor Ron DeSantis who will be deciding the future of reproductive rights in Florida. Political observers anticipated that lawmakers would be emboldened to introduce legislation that would trigger a ruling from the newly appointed Supreme Court justices on Floridian's constitutional right to privacy which affords protections on the right to an abortion. Since then lawmakers have made multiple

attempts at introducing anti-reproductive health bills with the intention of rolling back abortion rights through our new state Supreme Court.

While we knew this legislative session was going to be hostile for reproductive rights, that did not stop us from fighting against multiple attempts to restrict access to safe and legal abortion. This session we were able to defeat two of the most dangerous anti-reproductive health bills that our state has ever seen.

This year we saw the re-introduction of the six-week abortion ban (HB 271) which was an attempt to ban abortion altogether. At six weeks most women do not even know they are pregnant. This bill would have taken away a woman's right to make her own medical decisions before she even knew she had a decision to make.

Despite similar bills passing in other parts of the country, here in Florida, the bill never even received a committee hearing. In addition to the six-week ban, a twenty-week ban (SB 734) was also introduced but failed to gain any traction. These bills are part of a nationally coordinated effort to chip away at access to abortion. We've seen a 62% increase in abortion bans across the country (including in our neighboring states of Georgia and Alabama). However, in Florida, neither of these bills received any committee hearings thanks, in no small part, to a heightened level of opposition from Floridians including health care professionals, patients, students and advocates.

Ultimately, the legislature did pass a bill that will take away access to health care for young people. The Forced Parental Consent on Abortion bill (SB 404/HB 365) will now require young people to gain consent

for an abortion from their parent or legal guardian. Under this unconstitutional legislation, young people who are unable to obtain consent will have to navigate the complicated legal system on their own in order to go in front of a judge and obtain a “judicial bypass” that would determine if they are “mature enough” to get an abortion.

This forced parental consent legislation is opposed by nationally accredited health care organizations across the nation. While supporters of the bill claim that the intention is to improve family communication, professional medical organizations like the American Academy of Pediatrics have stated that these laws fail to achieve the intended benefit of promoting family communication. In fact, these laws only increase the risk of harm to the young person by delaying access to timely medical care.

While states like Massachusetts and Illinois are working to reverse the damage that forced parental consent laws have done in their state, Florida is moving full speed ahead to further endanger young people who, in many cases, have experienced abuse at the hands of their own parents and guardians.

In response to the fast-tracking of this bill, Planned Parenthood mobilized more than 200 supporters to come from all over the state in order to protest outside of the Senate chambers, as Senators entered to take a final vote. While our collective presence was powerful enough to delay the vote that day, legislators ultimately passed the bill the following week.

Instead of improving access to reproductive healthcare this legislative session, elected officials continued to interfere in Floridians’ most personal medical decisions. This legislation will disproportionately affect young people of color, youth from immigrant communities, young people that identify as LGBT, youth in the foster care system, and homeless youth. Young people in Florida should be supported with more information and resources, not burdened by more barriers and delays. While this bill passed in both chambers, our champions waged a spirited and thorough debate before the vote.

If this bill is challenged and taken to the new Florida Supreme Court, it will threaten reproductive health care throughout Florida by opening up the door to a more conservative reinterpretation of our state’s

constitutional right to privacy, which has protected abortion access in our state for the past 30 years.

Planned Parenthood will always fight to ensure that access to reproductive health care is defended – and the 2020 legislative session was no different. We deeply believe in the rights of all people — no matter who they are, where they live, or what they earn — to make their own personal decisions about their bodies, their families, and their life’s path, without political interference. This report provides an overview of the bills that the Florida Alliance of Planned Parenthood Affiliates advocated for and against, in conjunction with our allies and supporters, during the 2020 Legislative Session.

Anti-Reproductive Health Legislation

HB265/SB404- Parental Consent

This legislation would require young people to obtain parental consent prior to receiving an abortion. We know that most young people already seek the counsel of their parent or guardian when it comes to a decision like this. Leading health and medical professionals oppose parental involvement laws. Good family communication cannot be legislated. This bill does not allow exceptions for victims of rape, human trafficking or incest.

STATUS: The legislation passed in the House and Senate. The bill is waiting to be signed by Governor DeSantis and will go into effect on July 1st, 2020.

HB271 Fetal Heartbeat Ban

This legislation attempts to ban abortion as early as six weeks, when some people don't even know if they are pregnant yet. This bill is blatantly unconstitutional and endangers the health and life of pregnant people. This bill is reintroduced every year.

STATUS: Did not see any legislative movement.

SB734 Termination of Pregnancy

CoSponsors: Sen. Albritton

Prohibited termination of pregnancy based on a test result, diagnosis, or other reason for believing that the fetus has Down syndrome.

STATUS: Did not see any legislative movement.

HB1059/SB1634 Parental Bill of Rights

By: Reps. Grall, Sullivan

This duplicative and overreaching bill would have created a false choice between "parent's rights" and their children's constitutional rights. The bill would have affected LGBTQ youth by forcing school staff to 'out' a young queer person to their parent, against the young person's will. It would also have made it harder for a young person to access basic counseling. This was the second year that this bill was introduced.

STATUS: The legislation passed in the House. Was heard in two Senate committees but did not make it to a floor vote.

Pro-Reproductive Health Legislation

In addition to the attacks on reproductive health introduced during this legislative session, there were 5 bills that would have focused on promoting healthier lifestyles by providing access to preventive care and education. Below are bills that the Florida Alliance of Planned Parenthood Affiliates supported with champion bill sponsors:

SB 336 "Clinic Protection Act"

by Sen. Stewart

This legislation would have provided enhanced tools for law enforcement to use when protecting providers who are offering reproductive health care services and patients who are seeking reproductive health care services from being intentionally injured, intimidated, or interfered with. In the last few years there have been major increases in reports of threats and incidents of violence against reproductive health care providers and facilities. This legislation would have provided state and local authorities with more opportunities for enforcement of existing law.

STATUS: Did not see legislative action.

SB 44/ HB 1057 "Treatment of Sexual Assault Victims"

Co-sponsors: Rep. Eskamani

This bill requires any licensed facility treating a survivor of sexual assault to provide the survivor with medically accurate and comprehensive information regarding emergency contraception. Providing information about emergency contraception to sexual assault survivors during their hospital visit following an assault is critical- it saves survivors burdensome additional trips to providers and pharmacies during an already incredibly intense and traumatic time.

STATUS: Did not see legislative action.

HB 6047 "Repealer Bill of Unconstitutional Language"

by Rep. Eskamani

This legislation would have repealed unconstitutional language from 2016 TRAP (Targeted Regulation of Abortion Providers) legislation that attempted to defund family planning providers who provide safe and legal abortion care from offering preventive care such as birth control, cancer screenings, STI testing and treatment and other essential health care services. It would also have repealed unconstitutional language that would have jeopardized the privacy of people who have an abortion by requiring that at least 50 percent of those patient records be reviewed by state officials; a mandate not required in any other medical procedure.

STATUS: Did not see legislative action.

SB 60/ HB 95 "Representation of Women"

by Sen. Book, Rep. Polsky

This joint resolution bill would have proposed an amendment to the State Constitution to provide that neither house of legislature may vote on a bill that would affect access to abortion services unless at least half of members of that house are women.

STATUS: Did not see legislative action.

SB 1562 "State Contracting"

by Sen. Stewart

This bill would have prohibited an agency from entering into or renewing a contract for goods or services with a company that is domiciled in a state or territory that enacts legislation establishing restrictions on abortion in violation of United States Supreme Court precedent.

STATUS: Did not see legislative action.

Other Legislation of Interest

There were two other bills that would help many Floridians. Below are bills that the Florida Alliance of Planned Parenthood Affiliates supported:

SB 852/HB 1259 "Incarcerated Pregnant Women"

by Sen. Pizzo, Rep. Jones, Rep. Mercado

Co-sponsors: Sens. Braynon, Rodriguez (J), Taddeo, Torres, Jr. Reps. Brown, Bush III, Daniels, Eskamani, Geller, Goff-Marcil, Hart, Joseph, Killebrew, Newton, Polsky, Smith (C), Thompson, Watson (C)

This legislation requires that correctional facilities may not restrain pregnant women who are incarcerated and that any cavity searches must be conducted by a medical professional. In addition, the bill prohibits the involuntary placement of a pregnant prisoner in restrictive housing.

STATUS: This legislation passed in the House of Representatives and Senate. The bill is waiting to be signed into law by Governor DeSantis.

SB 206/HB 161 "Prohibited Discrimination"

The "Florida Competitive Workforce Act" would have sexual orientation and gender identity as impermissible grounds to discriminate in public lodging establishments and public food service establishments. It would revise the purposes of the Florida Civil Rights Act of 1992.

STATUS: This did not see legislative action.
